1. The Reality: Cyber Transformation Fails More Often Than It Succeeds

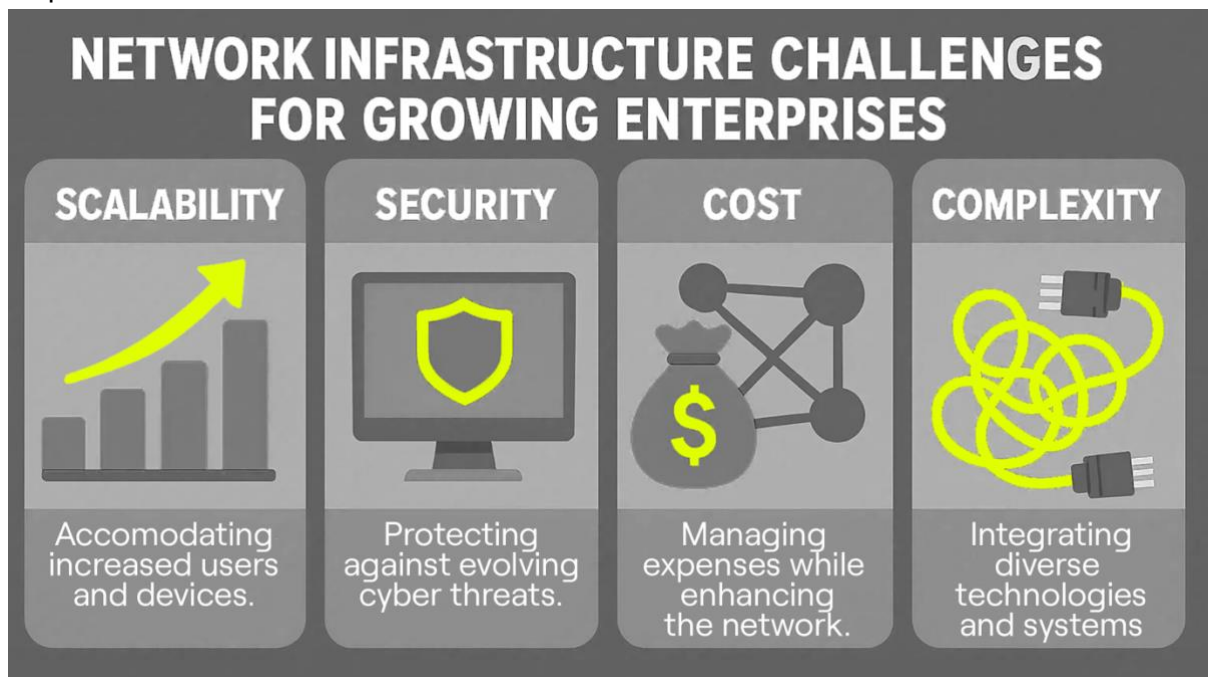

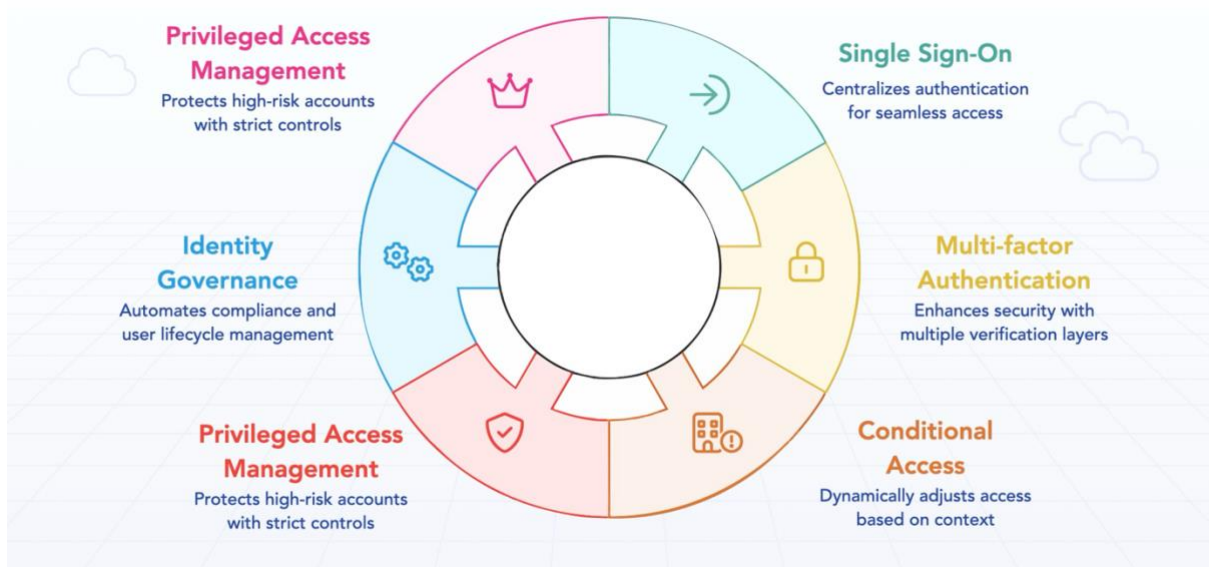
Understanding Why Cyber Uplift Fails
