Strong stakeholder management means:

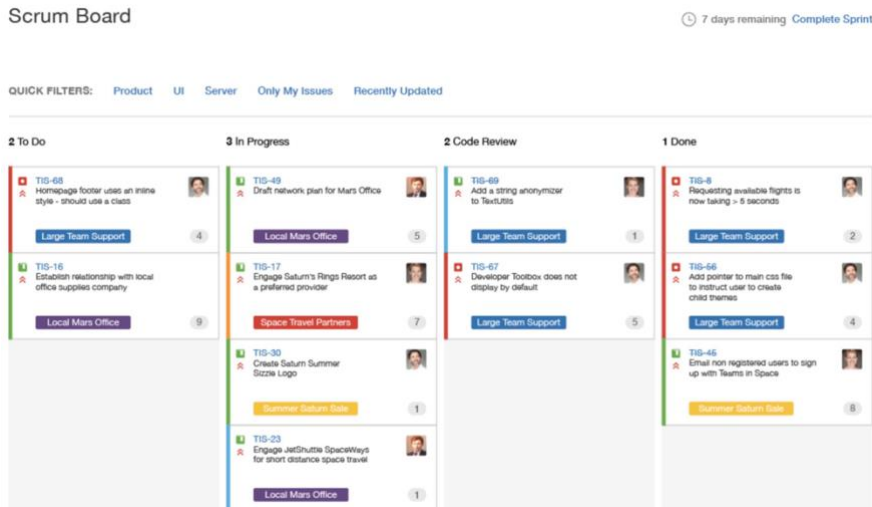
- Proactive communication

High-performing teams own the outcome - not just the tasks.

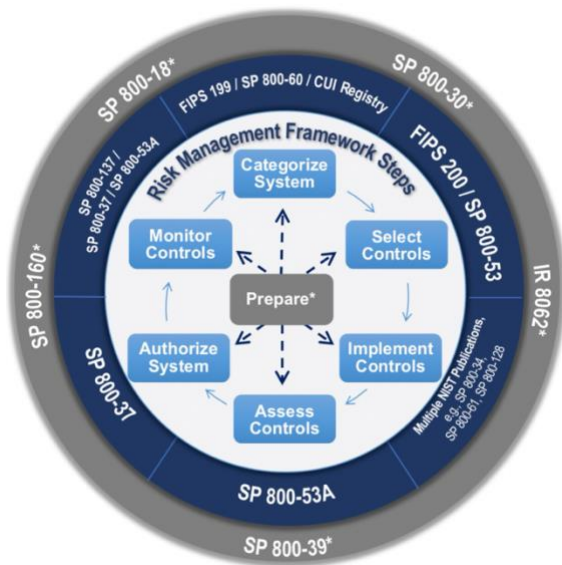
This culture is built through:
